- identify and evaluate the arguments of the farmers **and** the environmental agency
- explain your views on the situation, making it clear which side you support and why.

Base your letter on the article, but be careful to use your own words.

Begin your letter:

'Dear Editor,

I am writing in response to the views expressed in your recent article about the wolf threat...'

Write between 1½ and 2 sides, allowing for the size of your handwriting.

Up to 10 marks are available for the content of your answer, and up to 15 marks for the quality of your writing.

(b) Your community is celebrating a historic event in the open air. Describe what is happening around you.

Narrative Writing

4 (a) The teacher looked distraught, said 'That's it! I can't take any more', and walked out of the classroom. Continue the story.

OR

(b) Write a story which includes an amazing moment of realisation.
