### Either

- 1 Read carefully the following poem. The poet is writing about the time when her daughter has left home in order to study.

**How does the poet memorably convey her feelings about her daughter leaving home?**

To help you answer this question, you might consider:

- how she portrays the house and her daughter's room
- how the poet conveys her feelings when her daughter returns and then leaves again
- how she conveys her feelings in the final section of the poem.
