## Mathematical Formulae

## 1. ALGEBRA

Quadratic Equation
For the equation $a x^{2}+b x+c=0$,

$$
x=\frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^{2}-4 a c}}{2 a}
$$

Binomial Theorem

$$
(a+b)^{n}=a^{n}+\binom{n}{1} a^{n-1} b+\binom{n}{2} a^{n-2} b^{2}+\ldots+\binom{n}{r} a^{n-r} b^{r}+\ldots+b^{n},
$$

where $n$ is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r}=\frac{n!}{(n-r)!r!}$

## 2. TRIGONOMETRY

Identities

$$
\begin{gathered}
\sin ^{2} A+\cos ^{2} A=1 \\
\sec ^{2} A=1+\tan ^{2} A \\
\operatorname{cosec}^{2} A=1+\cot ^{2} A
\end{gathered}
$$

Formulae for $\triangle A B C$

$$
\begin{gathered}
\frac{a}{\sin A}=\frac{b}{\sin B}=\frac{c}{\sin C} \\
a^{2}=b^{2}+c^{2}-2 b c \cos A \\
\Delta=\frac{1}{2} b c \sin A
\end{gathered}
$$

1 Given that the graph of $y=(2 k+5) x^{2}+k x+1$ does not meet the $x$-axis, find the possible values of $k$.

2 Show that $\frac{\tan \theta+\cot \theta}{\operatorname{cosec} \theta}=\sec \theta$.

3 Find the inverse of the matrix $\left(\begin{array}{ll}4 & 2 \\ 5 & 3\end{array}\right)$ and hence solve the simultaneous equations

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 4 x+2 y-8=0, \\
& 5 x+3 y-9=0 .
\end{aligned}
$$



The diagram shows a circle, centre $O$, radius 12 cm . The points $A, B$ and $C$ lie on the circumference of this circle such that angle $A O B$ is 1.7 radians and angle $A O C$ is 2.4 radians.
(i) Find the area of the shaded region.
(ii) Find the perimeter of the shaded region.

5 (a) A security code is to be chosen using 6 of the following:

- the letters A, B and C
- the numbers 2,3 and 5
- the symbols * and \$.

None of the above may be used more than once. Find the number of different security codes that may be chosen if
(i) there are no restrictions,
(ii) the security code starts with a letter and finishes with a symbol,
(iii) the two symbols are next to each other in the security code.
(b) Two teams, each of 4 students, are to be selected from a class of 8 boys and 6 girls. Find the number of different ways the two teams may be selected if
(i) there are no restrictions,
(ii) one team is to contain boys only and the other team is to contain girls only.

6 A particle moves in a straight line such that its displacement, $x \mathrm{~m}$, from a fixed point $O$ after $t \mathrm{~s}$, is given by $x=10 \ln \left(t^{2}+4\right)-4 t$.
(i) Find the initial displacement of the particle from $O$.
(ii) Find the values of $t$ when the particle is instantaneously at rest.
(iii) Find the value of $t$ when the acceleration of the particle is zero.


In the diagram $\overrightarrow{A B}=4 \mathbf{a}, \overrightarrow{B C}=\mathbf{b}$ and $\overrightarrow{D C}=7 \mathbf{a}$. The lines $A C$ and $D B$ intersect at the point $X$. Find, in terms of $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{b}$,
(i) $\overrightarrow{D A}$,
(ii) $\overrightarrow{D B}$.

Given that $\overrightarrow{A X}=\lambda \overrightarrow{A C}$, find, in terms of $\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b}$ and $\lambda$,
(iii) $\overrightarrow{A X}$,
(iv) $\overrightarrow{D X}$.

Given that $\overrightarrow{D X}=\mu \overrightarrow{D B}$,
(v) find the value of $\lambda$ and of $\mu$.

8 (i) Find $\int\left(10 \mathrm{e}^{2 x}+\mathrm{e}^{-2 x}\right) \mathrm{d} x$.
(ii) Hence find $\int_{-k}^{k}\left(10 \mathrm{e}^{2 x}+\mathrm{e}^{-2 x}\right) \mathrm{d} x$ in terms of the constant $k$.
(iii) Given that $\int_{-k}^{k}\left(10 \mathrm{e}^{2 x}+\mathrm{e}^{-2 x}\right) \mathrm{d} x=-60$, show that $11 \mathrm{e}^{2 k}-11 \mathrm{e}^{-2 k}+120=0$.
(iv) Using a substitution of $y=\mathrm{e}^{2 k}$ or otherwise, find the value of $k$ in the form $a \ln b$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants.

9 A curve has equation $y=4 x+3 \cos 2 x$. The normal to the curve at the point where $x=\frac{\pi}{4}$ meets the $x$ - and $y$-axes at the points $A$ and $B$ respectively. Find the exact area of the triangle $A O B$, where $O$ is the origin.

10 (a) Solve $2 \cos 3 x=\sec 3 x$ for $0^{\circ} \leqslant x \leqslant 120^{\circ}$.
(b) Solve $3 \operatorname{cosec}^{2} y+5 \cot y-5=0$ for $0^{\circ} \leqslant y \leqslant 360^{\circ}$.

(c) Solve $2 \sin \left(z+\frac{\pi}{3}\right)=1$ for $0 \leqslant z \leqslant 2 \pi$ radians.

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
