1 Solve the inequality $|2 x-5|>3|2 x+1|$.

2 Using the substitution $u=3^{x}$, solve the equation $3^{x}+3^{2 x}=3^{3 x}$ giving your answer correct to 3 significant figures.

3 The angles $\theta$ and $\phi$ lie between $0^{\circ}$ and $180^{\circ}$, and are such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\tan (\theta-\phi)=3 \quad \text { and } \quad \tan \theta+\tan \phi=1 \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

Find the possible values of $\theta$ and $\phi$.

4 The equation $x^{3}-x^{2}-6=0$ has one real root, denoted by $\alpha$.
(i) Find by calculation the pair of consecutive integers between which $\alpha$ lies.
(ii) Show that, if a sequence of values given by the iterative formula

$$
\begin{equation*}
x_{n+1}=\sqrt{ }\left(x_{n}+\frac{6}{x_{n}}\right) \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

converges, then it converges to $\alpha$.
(iii) Use this iterative formula to determine $\alpha$ correct to 3 decimal places. Give the result of each iteration to 5 decimal places.

5 The equation of a curve is $y=\mathrm{e}^{-2 x} \tan x$, for $0 \leqslant x<\frac{1}{2} \pi$.
(i) Obtain an expression for $\frac{\mathrm{d} y}{\mathrm{~d} x}$ and show that it can be written in the form $\mathrm{e}^{-2 x}(a+b \tan x)^{2}$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants.
(ii) Explain why the gradient of the curve is never negative.
(iii) Find the value of $x$ for which the gradient is least.

6 The polynomial $8 x^{3}+a x^{2}+b x-1$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants, is denoted by $\mathrm{p}(x)$. It is given that $(x+1)$ is a factor of $\mathrm{p}(x)$ and that when $\mathrm{p}(x)$ is divided by $(2 x+1)$ the remainder is 1 .
(i) Find the values of $a$ and $b$.
(ii) When $a$ and $b$ have these values, factorise $\mathrm{p}(x)$ completely.

7 The points $A, B$ and $C$ have position vectors, relative to the origin $O$, given by

$$
\overrightarrow{O A}=\left(\begin{array}{l}
1 \\
2 \\
0
\end{array}\right), \quad \overrightarrow{O B}=\left(\begin{array}{l}
3 \\
0 \\
1
\end{array}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \overrightarrow{O C}=\left(\begin{array}{l}
1 \\
1 \\
4
\end{array}\right)
$$

The plane $m$ is perpendicular to $A B$ and contains the point $C$.
(i) Find a vector equation for the line passing through $A$ and $B$.
(ii) Obtain the equation of the plane $m$, giving your answer in the form $a x+b y+c z=d$.
(iii) The line through $A$ and $B$ intersects the plane $m$ at the point $N$. Find the position vector of $N$ and show that $C N=\sqrt{ }(13)$.

8 The variables $x$ and $\theta$ satisfy the differential equation

$$
\frac{\mathrm{d} x}{\mathrm{~d} \theta}=(x+2) \sin ^{2} 2 \theta,
$$

and it is given that $x=0$ when $\theta=0$. Solve the differential equation and calculate the value of $x$ when $\theta=\frac{1}{4} \pi$, giving your answer correct to 3 significant figures.

9 The complex number $3-\mathrm{i}$ is denoted by $u$. Its complex conjugate is denoted by $u^{*}$.
(i) On an Argand diagram with origin $O$, show the points $A, B$ and $C$ representing the complex numbers $u, u^{*}$ and $u^{*}-u$ respectively. What type of quadrilateral is $O A B C$ ?
(ii) Showing your working and without using a calculator, express $\frac{u^{*}}{u}$ in the form $x+\mathrm{i} y$, where $x$ and $y$ are real.
(iii) By considering the argument of $\frac{u^{*}}{u}$, prove that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)=2 \tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{1}{3}\right) . \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

(i) Find the exact value of the $x$-coordinate of $M$.
(ii) Calculate the value of $p$ for which the area of $R$ is equal to 1 . Give your answer correct to 3 significant figures.
